President's Comments: LTC "Davy" Davenport

The New Year has arrived, and so it's time to consider our chapter's goals for 2023. First and foremost, I hope that we'll all continue our collective efforts to ensure passage of important legislation that helps strengthen our military and improve the quality of life for servicemembers and their families. More about that in the below paragraph. Next, I'd like to see our chapter's membership base expand; it will really help if we all engage in some gentle recruiting whenever we encounter non-member officers in our chapter's expansive six-county territory. And, if I may do a little recruiting myself, please contact me if you're willing to fill one of our vacant Board of Directors and/or staff positions. None are arduous duty or take up much time, and being on our leadership team is a very rewarding experience. Some of our board and staff members are what the Navy terms "Plank Owners," meaning they've been continuously serving since our chapter (the ship) was founded well over a decade ago! Next, we'll certainly be continuing support for our three designated charities via the Benevolent Fund. We do have a couple of other supported organizations, including the Foothills Veterans Stand Down event, of which we're traditionally a major sponsor and have volunteers serving as event staff. Lastly, we should encourage chapter members and potential members to attend our membership meetings/dinners at Lake Hickory Country Club. The prestigious club generously hosts our chapter as guest members, but the club managers need a certain level of attendance to even hit the break-even point on costs for our dinning event and all that goes with it. In fact, I view those dinners as a unique opportunity for local officers and their spouses to enjoy warm camaraderie in an opulent setting that no other North Carolinas chapters can match.

The Legislative Action Center on MOAA's website features a host of pending legislation relevant to military personnel, with the opportunity for each of us to e-mail and/or contact our respective legislators. Currently, there are 143 separate and unprioritized legislative issues that one could act on via MOAA. We've asked National MOAA why there's no prioritization; the response was that they leave that up to each member, based on what they feel are the most important and pressing issues. It's likely that peppering a congressman with 100+ simultaneous e-mails from each member would diminish the desired effect; thus, the need to prioritize. My view is that members of outlying MOAA chapters don't necessarily need to fight hard for acquisition of new weapon systems; Service Chiefs and the Defense Industry are dealing with that, no matter what. In fact, the Pentagon is continually facing the dilemma: either modernize weapon systems or maintain quality of life for servicemembers and their families. Guess what, infrastructure on military bases (especially family housing) has severely deteriorated and health benefits are eroding-for both active duty and retired! And that's reflected in the recruiting shortfalls in all branches of service. So, I'm "taking action" first on issues that relate to quality of life and monetary compensation for servicemembers. Indeed, National MOAA is quick to work such issues, like the recent termination of Kroger group's participation in Express-Scripts' pharmacy network. Now, that's an example of a priority issue to act on via MOAA's easy to use system-it even provides us the draft e-mails! We need to do that because the first question a politician asks is: have my constituents shown concern about this issue; if so, then I'll surely co-sponsor and/or vote for passage of said bill. Let's all prioritize the issues and "Take Action" in 2023!

Colonel Dana Tucker Assumes Command: On December 1st, chapter member Colonel (Dr.) Dana Tucker went on orders as Commander of the NC Army National Guard's 139th Regiment-Regional Training Institute on Fort Bragg. Major General A. Boyette was the Presiding Officer for the formal change-of-command ceremony on December 3rd, and a reception was held afterwards. The139th RTI trains hundreds of students annually in the skill sets associated with artillerymen, combat medic, wheeled vehicle mechanic, and motor transport operator/driver. The unit also includes an extensive officer and non-commissioned officer professional development facility, and an Officer Candidate School. The 139th RTI campus on Fort Bragg contains 15 classrooms, an auditorium, a computer lab, a dining facility, and furnished barracks for 419 soldiers. In addition, the unit manages and operates the Camp Butner 4,000+ acre training center north of Raleigh. Clever New Scam: Scammer letters are being received with markings/logos of a legitimate on-line store. The letter states that an attempt to charge PayPal for a bogus and unspecified backorder has failed, and that the letter recipient must telephone a store representative (with either Visa, Master Card or Discover ready) at a 1-800 number to pay the small amount owed or send in a check or money order to an address given in the letter. Interestingly, no order number or details are given in the letter. The mailing address for the check has no company name, and it's not the real address of the company the scammer is pretending to be. It's best to call the actual company at their real phone number or log on to your customer account to see if there's any money owed.

New "VALife": Insurance program: The VA has launched a life insurance program for Veterans, age 80 or younger—although there are special provisions for Veterans older than that. The start date of the program is January 1st. This is a guaranteed acceptance program that has a two-year waiting period for coverage to take full effect, but all paid premiums plus interest will be paid to the beneficiary if the Veteran dies during the two-year waiting period. Premiums are based on age of the Veteran and the amount of coverage selected. Free Military Service Plaque: The "Together We Served" organization is offering to create personalized 11" x 6.5" service "plaques," themed with the individual's branch of service. The smart looking plaque is created online; then it's downloaded to the individual's computer for print out. Alternatively, the plaque document could be loaded to a CD or a memory stick and taken to a local store that prints on high-quality photo paper. While the plaque is free, one must register with "Together We Served" in order to get a plaque. Yes, most of our retired members have a "shadow-box" that portrays their individual military career, but some don't. Airline Perks for Military Families: The "Military.com" website just posted an extensive update on travel perks for military personnel traveling via commercial air, including an airline-by-airline breakdown on what perks each one offers. It's necessary to book directly with the selected airline because perks may not be offered by third-party booking services. Pet PCS Costs: Congress recently passed legislation that allows the DoD to cover transportation and boarding costs of servicemembers' pets when transferred to a new assignment. The Service Secretaries will be authorized to reimburse up to \$550 for a CONUS pet move and \$4,000 for an overseas pet move. This new benefit alleviates a huge burden for military families who were previously forced to either pay big money to transport pets or find a new home for pets that they couldn't afford to transport—cherished pets are often treated as family members!

- NEWS FROM THE FIVE MILITARY BRANCHES -

<u>ARMY</u>: The Bell V-280 Valor tiltrotor helicopter has been selected as the Army's future long-range assault aircraft, replacing the venerable UH-60 Black Hawk. V-280's can reach 280 mph, and max distance is 800 miles.

<u>NAVY</u>: Secretary of the Navy has declared that one of the yet to be constructed Amphibious Assault Ships will be named USS Fallujah; ships of this class are traditionally named in honor of major U.S. Marine Corps battles.

<u>MARINES</u>: Innovators developed a transportable Atmospheric Portable Water Sustainment Unit that produces twenty gallons of water a day by converting humid air into liquid and then purifying it for use as drinking water.

<u>AIR FORCE</u>: The B-21 Raider stealth bomber was recently unveiled; the Air Force intends to purchase 100 of these nuclear or conventional bombers at \$753 million each. Raiders can be flown with or without human crews.

<u>SPACE FORCE</u>: Instead of new PME schools, Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies is now the in-residence Intermediate Service School and Senior Service School for Guardian Officers.
